SBMWD has over 126 million gallons of water storage capacity in 38 active storage reservoirs and tanks throughout the city.

FISCAL YEAR 2017-2018 ACCOMPLISHMENTS




- Received California Society of Municipal Finance Officer Meritorious Budget Award for fiscal year 2017-2018.
- Implemented changes in banking services that increased Departmental interest revenue by \$282,000 and decreased bank charges by 50%, or \$37,000.
- Installed/replaced over 16,000 feet of water supply pipeline with over 5,000 feet of water main replacements related to developer projects.
- Pepper Linden Transmission Main completed 1,300 feet of new 12-inch ductile iron pipe installed by Department staff.
- 13th Street Main completed 1,200 feet of new 8-inch ductile iron pipe installed by Department staff



- Field and Meter Services completed over 24,000 service work orders
- Cleaned an average of 85,000 feet of wastewater collections pipelines per month.

CONSERVATION IN OUR COMMUNITY: A GARDEN SIDE CHAT WITH WATER HISTORIAN SUZIE EARP

Suzie Earp, water historian and self-professed plant lover, is the current director of the Water Resources Institute at the California State University of San Bernardino. We recently had the opportunity to visit Suzie at her home and chat with her about her garden full of California native plants. We also discussed the importance of looking after our local water resources.

Tell us a bit about yourself and your involvement in water conservation in San Bernardino.

Both my husband and I grew up here. I was born here at Saint Bernardine's hospital, and we have lived here for more than 60 years overall. I am the director of The Water Resources Institute, and I managed the water conservation garden at Cal State. Being in the water field means I'm familiar with the ebb and flow of droughts, and floods; we're always dealing with one or the other.

Why is Water conservation important to you?

The Bunker Hill groundwater basin serves the population and it's well worth saving. We need to do whatever we have to do to preserve it because it is the most precious thing that we have.

We only have a certain amount of water. There is no more water coming into the water cycle. This means we need to be very careful with the supplies we do have available. In my opinion, we have the states most beautiful aquifer. Without it, none of us would be living here. However, the aquifer is not an endless supply and we need to be careful with how we manage it.

Why did you choose to convert your lawn to a drought tolerant landscape?

When we moved to this house we had this big grass lawn, but we were unhappy with it because it was very water intensive. Slowly but surely we began to replace our grass with native and drought tolerant plants. Actually, I think the drought tolerant varieties are prettier. Most of all, I enjoy the flowers and wildlife. With native and drought tolerant plants you get a lot more butterflies, hummingbirds, and bees.

If you do it right, your landscape looks pretty, and it smells great every time it rains. Our landscaping just absorbs all that water and smells so good. The reward is that it looks beautiful, it flowers, and it smells like Christmas! I am always out here on a rainy day.
